DISTRICT CONVENTION HIGHLIGHTS

An inspiring opening service began the convention under the theme, "Preach the Gospel." The sermon was given by Professor John Brenner from Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary. The message emphasized the importance of the Seminary in the preaching of the Gospel and in training faithful messengers of the Gospel. The communion service was attended by over 400 worshipers.

The Synodical Council report informed the convention floor that the once balanced budget was now not balanced because of lower Congregation Mission Offerings (CMOs). As a result programs needed to be cut back and less mission endeavors so that the budget could be brought back into balance. The World Mission report enlightened the convention on the many world areas where we are "Preaching the Gospel." The world is crying for the precious Gospel that we can provide. Home Missions is once again opening new mission congregations but at a slower rate than was hoped for in this biennium.

Day two began with an opening devotion based on Isaiah's "Preaching the Gospel." Pastor Caleb Kurbis was the devotional leader. The historical paper, "The Seminary's Service to the Synod," was presented by Professor John Brenner. This paper followed the history of the seminary as it prepared and continues to prepare pastors to Preach the Gospel. It was noted that students preparing for the pastoral ministry at the college level is at a low level. If this continues we will have a shortage of pastors in the years to come. The presentation was followed by a video which highlighted a 2014 graduate who received his first call.

The Tuesday afternoon session began with a presentation by Missionary Jon Bare on his work and our work in China. Even though there are many challenges of our work here, The Lord has blessed our efforts. Today we have 64 teachers teaching ESL classes and 5 full time missionaries working among the 1.35 billion people. There are actually Lutheran congregations established on the mainland. Keep this ministry in your prayers.

The closing day of the convention opened with a morning devotion by Pastor Stephen Mueller and was based on Peter's sermon to a Gentile household. Just as the fences came down around Peter allowing him to preach to a new group of people so we also can freely preach to all nations.

The convention opened with words from district president John Guse. He asked for our prayers as he serves another term as our district president. He also thanked the outgoing officers and outgoing committee chairs or committee members for their faithful service to the district.

A report was given by Pastor Jon Schroeder on the New Hymnal project. We are about 10 years out from getting a new hymnal. The project has begun and going strong. A website is available for perusal and keeping up to date as to how the project is going. Hopefully this project will be completed in less than 10 years.


