## FROM THE PASTOR

Open Bible had its first funeral since I arrived here in late August. It was held on November 17<sup>th</sup> at 11:00 am. The journey of Douglas Hartshorn to his heavenly home was celebrated on that day. The text that was considered was from the book of Revelation, where we read, "Be faithful unto death and I will give you a crown of life." Doug loved his Savior Jesus Christ and was faithful to him. Jesus kept his promise to Doug. The promise reads, "because I live, you also shall live." After the service the women of Open Bible under Marilyn Acklam put together a nice luncheon for the family and friends. The committal service was held on Monday, November 19<sup>th</sup> at National cemetery.

I am amazed at how the Lord continues to work behind the scenes at Open Bible to provide us with outreach opportunities. The funeral director is presently not active in any Christian church. He is a former Missouri Synod Lutheran and would like to talk about the differences between the Wisconsin Synod and the Missouri Synod. As I road to National cemetery on Monday in the hearse, the driver was Hugh Gibson, former state representative. I shared with him how it would be so nice if we had a better access to our church on Woodridge, and that we were only able to obtain golf cart accessibility. This week, we should be putting the data of our Membership into Power Church Plus, a worship-accounting software program which was recently installed on our new computer in the secretary's office. This computer is networked with the laptop in my office, the laptop on our Bible study cart, and the laptop in the church. It is my hope that all membership

information will now be found on the mainframe in the office of our part-time secretary, the counters will eventually record contributions there, and our Treasurer will have remote access to this computer to put in his information. This system will allow us to be more efficient and better able to do all things decently and in order at Open Bible. Special thanks to James Langer for building and networking this system.

Thanks also to James Langer and Keith Mackey for filming the funeral service of Douglas Hartshorn. Copies of the service on disk are being made available to the Hartshorn family members.

Our first GriefShare support group meeting will be held on November 29<sup>th</sup> at Open Bible from 6:30 pm until 8:00 pm. It is a 13 week study and is open to anyone who has lost a loved one in the past few years and is still grieving. Brochures of the program have been dropped off at the local funeral homes. One idea that we might pursue is to recruit someone in our congregation to research obituary information from the Villages Sun, find out the local address of the family members who remain, and send them our Griefshare information so that they might have an opportunity to join us.

Our Mid-week Advent services will be held this year on Wednesday December 5<sup>th</sup>, 12<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> at 6:00 pm. The theme will be "The Carols of Christmas". A meal will preceed the services at 5:00 pm. If you are not comfortable with driving at night, please sign up for a ride on the sheet located on the Friendship table in the fellowship hall. What a great opportunity this will provide our membership to be able to serve others and get to know better those they give a ride to church. At our next Voters' meeting, the congregation will decide future special service times.
